# The real purpose?

I wrote some of this for the TCT newsletter, but realise it is equally applicable to St James' and want more of you to see it:

I like computers. I find them endlessly fascinating, even miraculous, and am old enough to have been brought up on things the size of warehouses, with which we communicated via punched cards: then later, by a typing terminal. In those days I used a computer as a big calculator, to do things which would take far too long by hand. The basic commands were simple and fairly direct, but in code. Then came 'software' ('That will never catch on! Paying money for someone else's programs?') Nowadays, a huge percentage of the processing power of the computer is used up in running the computer itself and enabling the other applications beginning with the graphical user interface (remember Windows 1,2 and 3?). The machine takes longer and longer to start up from scratch, and new programs become more and more demanding, so the computer needs to be more and more powerful...

Something similar happens with our churches (and I guess all other human organisations). Our church becomes an organisation, even an institution, without really trying. The more established our church is, the more energy is needed to keep it going, and the process is very quick: even newly planted churches find the same happening in a short space of time. We actually spend far more resources in terms of person-hours and money on the running of the church than on the underlying purpose, sometimes then justifying that by making ourselves believe that the running of the organisation IS the purpose... but often just losing sight of the purpose altogether.

So what is the purpose of our church? I could just stop there in a very irritating way and leave you to ponder it; however I will point you instead to Acts 1:8 where Jesus says to his early church, 'You will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth'. Couple that with Jesus' great commission in Matthew 28, 'Go... and make disciples' and we have something against which to measure all we do. There are not actually many direct commands in scripture about the purpose of the church – but all are about gathering others, proclaiming the good news in word and deed, and demonstrating the miraculous powers of God.

No one individual can do this, nor can any one church. Not geographically, nor in terms of reaching different cultures, families and social groups. I believe there is a strong case to be made for a multiplicity of individual churches, which is after all the reality on the ground, and also within a church many smaller groups: but if so it becomes vital to be 'networked' (to revert to the computer analogy) and to have ready means of communicating. As with computers, that can be a real pain and time consuming both to set up and to keep all units on board, but the power is then enormous and can change the world.

At St James', mission in Taunton and beyond is our overall purpose. To facilitate this is the reason for trying to streamline our church structures so that I, and all of us, can spend more time on what we believe God is calling us to be. Primarily this is to be worshipping people, keeping in close touch with God through his Holy Spirit. Let us not give up meeting together ... instead let us encourage one another - that's not me, it's Hebrews 10!) Whatever our gifts and our place in the body (read 1 Cor 12), we need one another because God needs each one. So we also need to be concerned for one another, helping one another(read Eph 4:32) – all ages, all types of people, all caring and being cared for so that we are released for God's mission.

So please whether in worship, groups, pastoral care, administration, finance, buildings, communication, young people's work or by just being there: plug in and see your contribution however little or great as part of something much bigger, and supernatural. God is extending his kingdom. Let's spend the time and effort we need on the internal workings; but let us not confuse the church, or the group within the church, or the denomination, with the purpose. The media love to use the Pope, a Cardinal, a Bishop, a Dean or even some local minister as representing 'the church' usually to set them up as a straw man in order to shoot us all down... but the church as God sees it is one body composed of all our myriad parts, united in his divine mission and purpose: to know Christ and to make him better known.

# A recipe to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee

#### Jubilee Chicken

#### (Variation on Coronation Chicken)

(Adapted from Slimming World Magazine)

#### Ingredients

8 skinless chicken breasts, cooked and cut into bite-sized pieces

6 level tablespoons mayonnaise

200g fromage frais

Juice of 1 lemon

1 garlic clove, finely chopped

6 tablespoons passata

A dash of Tabasco sauce

1 level tablespoon mango chutney

1 tablespoon mild curry powder

Handful of finely chopped coriander leaves

Handful of finely chopped mint

Salt and pepper

8 spring onions, finely chopped

300g cherry tomatoes, quartered

50g red peppers, finely chopped

1 large cucumber, cubed

1 iceberg lettuce, roughly chopped



#### Method

Mix together the mayonnaise, fromage frais, lemon juice, garlic, passata, Tabasco, curry powder, chutney, mint and coriander in a large bowl and season well.

Add the spring onions, tomatoes, peppers, cucumber and chicken and mix well.

Arrange the shredded lettuce in a serving dish and spoon the chicken mixture on top.

# **Easter Experience:**



The Easter Experience took place a week before Holy week started, the aim being to tell the Easter story to the children of Archbishop Cranmer School through the series of tableaux that were still present during Easter week services. Planning for it began in May 2011, with a small team - Sue Lucas Nic Tall and Jenny Wakefield.

Sue in addition acted as our liaison with the school and we received the support and encouragement of both the previous and current Head teacher. In the weeks before and during the event Sue worked very hard with the staff to ensure there would be smooth arrangements and good follow up.



The results were fantastic, and were still being felt in the school. The children were enthusiastic and very attentive to the presentations. In all we must have had about 275 pupils who came in, which included the Reception and Year 1 classes who came in on the Friday and had a shorted version of the experience. They too really seemed to get the idea. The school staff were fulsome in their praise, and were able to carry the ideas back into

school and do follow up in their lessons.

A small group of us were invited to the assembly on the last day of term, and we were very impressed with the work that the classes shared with us.

Since then in May the school has had a

SIAS (Statutory Inspection of Anglican Schools) inspection and the



Easter Experience received some very positive feedback from the Inspector, the telling point being that its impact and memory was still alive 6 weeks after the event!

Easter Experience involved over 30 people, in various roles, many people doing more than

one thing. From people making costumes, setting up scenes, publicity, schools work, acting, welcoming, making and serving biscuits to the children, lending props, moving chairs etc etc. It has been a very rewarding and humbling experience for all involved. Those involved included the following:

For the whole world we are born...

My father used to buy the Daily Telegraph primarily for the crossword and the obituaries – I suspect he was not alone! I continue to buy the Church Times for similar reasons, although it is not the crosswords that attract me, but the monthly diary column of a former Rector of Hackney, John Pridmore, who has a wonderful gift of connecting the things of heaven with the things of the earth!

However, at the beginning of May it was not the diary column that grabbed my attention but the obituary written for Canon Eric James, a priest who I came to admire deeply while I was a vicar in South London. I suspect that throughout our lives we come across people who walk a little way with us on our journey of faith and provide the necessary support and encouragement for us during that time so that we can continue our adventure with God.

Eric was one such person. I had gone from leafy suburbia to be a Vicar in South London, in the heart of the Surrey Docks, with precious little experience of what it meant to live in the Inner City, let alone to be a priest in the 'Inner City.' Eric was born and brought up in Dagenham, and although he had spent time as a college chaplain in Cambridge his heart was with and for those who lived in the urban communities, most of whom had long been out of touch with the church. In this context he sought to live the Christian Gospel, experimenting with new forms of worship and group meetings in flats, and exercising his pastoral skills in ways long remembered by the local population

He was, as some of you may remember, one of the architects of 'Faith in the City', a report that had a profound impact on church and society in recession hit Britain in the 1980's. It gave huge encouragement to church communities, small and large, to engage with the issues affecting their communities and so make a difference to the lives of some of the poorest and most disadvantaged people.

Eric was someone who believed deeply in a gospel that could and should change lives, change churches and change communities and I continue to be deeply grateful for his wisdom and his inspiration. Amongst his writings was the biography of another radical Christian thinker, Bishop John Robinson. Bishop John had come from a long line of clerics, and it was the family motto which had been instilled in him from his earliest years that connect both Eric and John and remain an inspiration to my own Christian witness – 'not for ourselves alone but for the whole world are we born.' Only by this maxim can we hope to transform the kingdoms of this world into the kingdom of our God.'

# Introducing.....

Still waters run deep, the saying goes, and this describes Chris Rickard very well. She is one of those quiet, unassuming people who beaver away in the background; her ready smile, gentle sense of humour and down to earth consistent faith are apparent to all those who know and work with her.

Chris came to St. James in 2001, having just moved into Taunton as a home owner for the first time. She had previously lived in Ilton, worked in Taunton and worshipped in Ilminster, so this was the first time she

could do all three in the same place. Like many Christians moving somewhere new, this was an opportunity to 'try out' the local churches and St. James was on her list as it had a reputation for being an 'active' church. She recalls her first Sunday sitting in the pews (this was in the days when we still had pews in the centre aisle) and realising by the end of the service why most people sat in the North and South Aisles, where the comfy chairs were situated. Not long after she arrived, the floors and pews were removed and she remembers some of the services held during this time at Archbishop Cranmer School, including one she helped to lead on the Sunday after 9/11.

So why did Chris keep coming – partly it was the worship, but also she was impressed by the friendliness of people; she was adopted into the unofficial 20-30s group that existed at that time and started getting involved. That 'getting involved' hasn't stopped since. Chris was very active in supporting our youth worker during 2004-7, and she continues to participate in children's work. Currently you will often see Chris in the worship group where her love of singing enables her to contribute to our Sunday morning worship. If she is not there then in all likelihood she will be in the hall either helping with the senior adventurers or getting messy with Messy Church. Chris is also a deputy warden so on the first Sunday of the month, she's at the back of church, as part of the team making sure everyone is happy and everything is going right.



Chris has a love of drama and you may well remember her in the 2010 Panto, where her singing and acting skills and her portrayal of Yasmin were much appreciated. More recently she was involved in the Easter Experience, helping to tell the Easter story to over 250 children.

But that only tells the story of the last 11 years, and there is much more to Chris than that. She told me that she is one of those people who can't really remember not being a Christian, having been brought up in a Church-going family, the only child in an otherwise large family of uncles, aunts and cousins. Retrospectively she recalls her first sense of God's awesome presence having a personal relevance was when singing in Stainer's St. John's passion, at the age of 6. At 16 she went to college to study drama and it was at college she started thinking more deeply about her beliefs. She attended a local church in Weston, which helped to reinvigorate her faith.

In her twenties, Chris spent 2 years with Operation Mobilisation – then led by George Verwer, which took mission to other countries through book ministry and evangelistic events. These were radical and special years, working in an organisation which relied on faith for survival. There were however some lighter moments, and Chris asked me with a twinkle in her eye – "Have I ever told you about the time I was nearly arrested for drug smuggling". She and her fellow house mates and other guests following a recent mission, were visited by three policemen who questioned them about a package sent to one of the team containing a quantity of white powder. Fortunately it was baking soda sent by the girl's mum so she could bake soda bread for the team!!

In those heady days of the 80s, not having a Damascus Road testimony did at one time worry her, but as time has gone on she has recognised the route to faith is less important than a living relationship with Jesus Christ on a daily basis.

Since then Chris has worked for a large National Company's head office in Taunton as a Payroll Advisor. She has been there now for over 20 years and she enjoys her work; although she did take time out to study for a degree in Social Science, which she now finds useful in the people aspects of her job. Despite the recent harsh economic climate, she feels her company do consider the welfare of their workforce and she is proud to work for a company that supports and encourages various projects to raise money for charitable causes.

Chris values the church family she belongs to and getting involved is an important way to meet and get to know people. This was tested out when she was ill with anaemia some years ago, and worried she would lose her voice – the support she felt from her church family was amazing.

She also enjoys going to Greenbelt or in the past Spring Harvest, because this challenges in a deeper way and brings you into contact with people who are not afraid to address the difficult questions and dilemmas of faith. Her own faith is deeply and consistently part of her identity. The same person who goes to church also goes to work on Monday morning. When I asked her if she could sum up her approach to faith — her reply was simple and straightforward "To thine own self be true .... after all you can't kid God".

In a heavy based saucepan, gently melt the margarine. Add the Mars Bar pieces and stir until no lumps are left.

Take the pan off the heat and stir in the Rice Crispies – adding more if the mixture will take it. Spread the mixture in the tin and press it down evenly with the back of a spoon.


Cover with the melted chocolate and leave to set. Cut into 24 bars when cold – or cut into less bars if you are feeding a very greedy monster!

# **ALL AT SEA**

Ocean Yacht Racing and God

**Question:** What gets 50 men out of bed and into the centre of Taunton by 7.45 on a Saturday morning?

**Answer:** A men's breakfast, but not just any breakfast – this was a cooked breakfast at the Lawns Social Club, followed by a fascinating account of life on an ocean racing yacht.

On May 12<sup>th</sup> men from St James, St Peter's Lyngford, Oakwood and Wellington Baptist, together with 13 of their friends, came together for breakfast to chat and to hear Nick Webb from Oakwood Church speak.

The cooked breakfasts disappeared pretty quickly, despite their size! What is it about men and a full English?! Over breakfast new contacts were made as men from different churches got to know one another. It was great for the friends who are not yet Christians to meet those who are and to realise that Christians are just ordinary people.

After breakfast Nick, who works at the Hydrographic Office, described his experience of one leg of a round the world yacht race, a journey which took him from Hawaii to Hong Kong, via Japan and China. We were given a glimpse of some of the challenges faced by yachtsmen and women living in cramped quarters on wild seas, as much as 1500 miles from the nearest land. Even boiling a kettle can be a challenge when the yacht is being tossed about in the ocean. Sleeping is decidedly difficult when, in order to return a sodden sail to its storage on the floor below your bunk, the hatch above where you are sleeping is opened in the middle of a stormy night, letting in wind, rain and sea water. Photographs illustrated the highs (such as magnificent sunsets and starlit skies over the ocean) and the lows (being unable to get dry for days on end) of day to day life on board.

Nick concluded his talk by sharing how he came to faith (God used the testimony of his family and two Alpha courses) and how his faith was severely tested in the few days immediately before he joined the yacht. He was besieged by doubts, and on the verge of turning round and going home but, after wrestling with God on the issue of trust, he stepped out in faith and went ahead.

A number of the men who are not yet Christians made positive comments about what Nick said. It is our prayer that God will speak to them and that they will come to faith themselves.



# **PCC Roundup**

## **Annual Meeting**

The PCC received the annual report and accounts, prior to their presentation at the annual meeting. If anyone missed seeing these comprehensive documents, please ask for a copy.

Two key facts from the annual report are that attendance increased by around 15% during 2011, and that the number of home groups increased from 10 to 15, with 125 members, representing 77% of the church membership.

# **Strategy and Vision**

The main item on the PCC's agenda continues to be the strategy to enable the church to grow. The process of appointing coordinators for key aspects of the church's life is proceeding steadily, and appointments to the Teaching and Worship coordinator roles are expected in June. A number of people are thinking about the other roles, and these posts will be announced in due course.

#### **Financial matters**

At the annual meeting, Tina Andrews reported that the accounts for 2011 showed a deficit of £2,535, due mainly to an exceptionally heavy year for repairs.

At the May PCC meeting, Tina's first financial report for 2012 showed matters proceeding as expected. However, it must be borne in mind that we are now reliant on the whole of the projected income from hall hire to support the present pattern of ministry.

After a review of capital expenditure priorities, the PCC approved two projects:

- The installation of video screens to enable people sitting in the aisles to see words of songs and a camera view of what is happening "up front" (and replacement of the crèche screen).
- To plan the refurbishment of the Large Hall.

## **Children & Young People**

The annual report noted that C&YP work is in transition, with young people's expectations being different to how they were only a short time ago. At the May PCC, the lack of 10-15 year olds was noted, a phenomenon known in the wider church as the "Child Exodus". Efforts are being made to find ways of involving young people in 'adult' activities, and it is important not to see C&YP groups as being separate from the main body of the church. It is up to all church members to help young people find a place in the church community.

## **Mission to Firepool**

Knightstone Housing has appointed three community workers to the new Firepool site. The church is actively welcomed as a partner in building the new community, and consideration is being given to such things as using the church kitchen for cooking classes.

#### "The Peace"

The PCC noted the concerns, raised at the annual meeting, about the awkwardness felt by many newcomers and visitors during "The Peace". Nicki Bradford is going to prepare a discussion paper.

#### **Premises matters**

Work on converting the SW Porch into a small room which can be used as an extension to the crèche is almost complete.

TDBC is now dismantling the floodlights. The PCC is looking at installing a timer for the light outside the church door.

The repairs in the Side Chapel are awaiting the wall drying out.

The latest PCC minutes and agenda are displayed on a board near the coffee area, and previous minutes can be inspected in the office. The "Contact Points" leaflet is available near the photograph board; this tells you who to talk to about the many and varied things we do as a church.
