

Pioneering - Exploring new ways of showing love and being church

At the heart of the Church of England's missional vision is a little phrase that poses a challenge for each generation. The Church "professes the faith uniquely revealed in the Holy Scriptures and sets forth in the catholic creeds ... which faith the Church is called upon to proclaim afresh in each generation"

As Christians, we are called by God to proclaim the Gospel **afresh** in our generation.



The gospel must be preached afresh and told in new ways to each generation, since every generation has its own unique questions. The gospel must constantly be forwarded to a new address, because the recipient is repeatedly changing his place of address.

Read Isaiah 49. 16-21

Isaiah receives a vision of hope for the future. God will change the ruins and the desolation of the past (due to their disobedience) and bring new life and a new future. For many Christians, the decline of the Christian faith and the growth of unrest, violence and confusion, feels very much like experiencing "ruins and desolation." Yet we are people of hope, called to reflect the character and intentions of God in our generation.

Isaiah encourages his reader to "lift up our [your] eyes and look around"

• What signs of God's new life do you perceive at St James, in the town and across the world?


The value we are currently exploring is Pioneering and the Church of England has produced a useful definition of what pioneers are:

"Pioneers are people called by God, who are the first to see and creatively respond to the Holy Spirit's initiatives with those outside the church; gathering others around them as they seek to establish a new contextual Christian community." So, pioneers receive an insight and a sense of calling to do something for those who can't or won't connect with the life of the church in its current form. Pioneers are not just dreamers, they are 'dreamers who do', willing to take the risk to try to make a difference. Pioneers are leaders capable of gathering 28th of April 2024

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people round a vision for a new missional venture and facilitating the ministry of that team to bring something new to birth."

While there might be one or a few people in our congregation called to be pioneers in the sense described here above, as a faith community, we should be open to explore new ways of showing love and being church.
